Work out what bridge club, mature and old-fashioned mean by using the way the book uses and explains them.

Essential question

How does the book tell you what a bridge club is, and what mature and oldfashioned mean here?

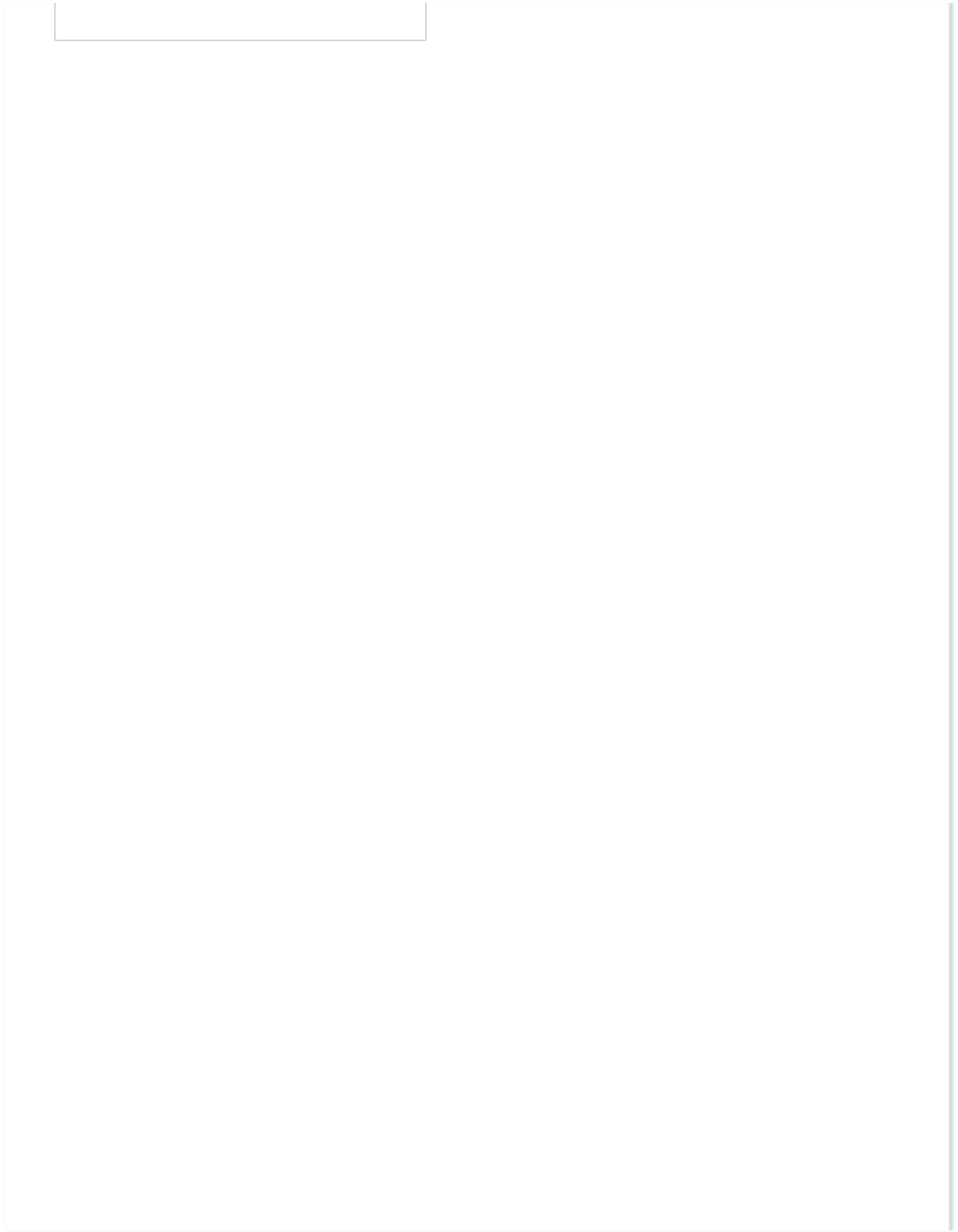

Lesson sequence

1	Launch · 5 min
Focus:	A sensible wrong guess
Teacher direction:	If you heard that someone belonged to a bridge club, what would you guess they did?
Prepared text:	Passage 4
2	Teacher model · 8 min
Teacher model:	Watch what happens at bridge club. Kara guesses out loud that it means touring bridges, which is a fair guess from the word. Then Jo says the useful part: bridge is the name of a card game. The wrong guess and the correction are one line apart, and the correction is my definition.
Prepared text:	Passage 4

3 Bridge club · 7 min

Focus:	Reading the correction
Teacher direction:	In Passage 4, what does Kara guess a bridge club is, and what does Jo say it really is?



Expected answer:	Kara guesses they go and tour bridges. Jo says bridge is the name of a card game, and that her parents get together with friends once a month to play cards and eat dinner.
Prepared text:	Passage 4

Focus:	A word defined by its opposite
Teacher direction:	In Passage 13, Jo sets two ways of acting against each other. Write both, and then write what mature means here.
Expected answer:	Jo says that behaving like a baby keeps you treated as one, while behaving more grown-up gets your growing up noticed. So mature means behaving in a grown-up way.
Prepared text:	Passage 13

Teacher guidance

Why this text works: The bridge club exchange is a small model of how a reader should behave: Kara guesses wrong out loud, Jo corrects her in the next line, and the correction is the definition.
