Standard

Determine the meaning of words, phrases, figurative language, and academic/content-specific vocabulary in a text.

Why this lesson is a winner Students explain how the same phrase works literally for an art supply and figuratively in ordinary language.

Decision: WINNER

2. Two Meanings at Once

Full lesson

TIME

30 minutes

OBJECTIVE

Find the sentences that mean one thing about art supplies and another thing about a party, and say both meanings.

STUDENT PRODUCT

Rows for each sentence with a box for each of its two meanings

FOCUS

Everyday sayings that are literally true of the thing saying them

Essential question

How can one sentence be true about a pencil and true about a guest at the same time?

Materials

The book The narration lines, copied without the pictures

Text to mark before teaching

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Passage 3 — Art sprawled across the page holding a pencil Passage 5 — crayons on a sheet of paper, Art drawing Passage 8 — Art kneeling with both hands flat in smeared colour Passage 11 — the same scissors and tape roll, the tape now grinning Passage 12 — a pale page, a thin trail of glue running down it

Lesson sequence

1	One sentence, twice · 6 min
Focus:	A saying that is also a description

Teacher model:	Read the eraser line. Say the everyday meaning first, then what an eraser literally does, and show they are the same sentence.
Prepared text:	Passage 3
2	Both columns · 10 min
Teacher direction:	For each of these lines, write what the saying usually means and what the supply actually does.
Expected answer:	Thinking outside the box means having a new idea; crayons genuinely live in a box. Blending in means fitting into a crowd; pastels genuinely blend.
Prepared text:	Passage 5, Passage 8

3 The two on one page · 8 min

Teacher direction:	This page has two of them in two sentences. Find both and write the pair of meanings for each.
Expected answer:	Cutting jokes means telling them, and scissors cut. Having the tape rolling means keeping the laughing going, and a roll of tape rolls.
Prepared text:	Passage 11
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4 Why it is funny · 6 min	
Focus:	The joke depending on the right supply
Teacher direction:	Ask why the joke stops working if you swap the glue for the scissors.
Prepared text:	Passage 12

Teacher guidance

Why this text works: Each of these lines is an ordinary saying about people attached to a supply the saying happens to describe exactly, so both meanings are on the page and neither has to be supplied by the teacher.

Expected answer:	An eraser really does cross lines, and crossing a line also means going too far. Crayons come in a box, and thinking outside the box means having a new idea. Pastels blend colour, and blending in means fitting into a crowd. Scissors cut, and cutting jokes means telling them. Glue holds things together, and so does somebody who keeps a party from falling apart.
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Model: This page has the eraser almost stopping the party and then deciding not to cross a line. An eraser does cross lines - that is its job. But not crossing a line also means not going too far, so the sentence is doing both at once.

Support and extension

Above: Write a new sentence of your own about one supply that works both ways, and say what the two meanings are.

Below: For one sentence, point at the supply and say what it really does.

Assessment

Look for:	Gives both meanings, not just the funny one.
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Connects the saying to what that supply actually does.

Uses the words on the page rather than a retelling.

2	Both columns · 7 min
Teacher direction:	Write the two meanings for each of these lines.
Expected answer:	Outside the box: a new idea, and where crayons live.

Cutting jokes: telling them, and what scissors do.

Prepared text:	3 Why it is funny · 3 min
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Passage 5, Passage 11

Focus:	The joke depending on the right supply
Teacher direction:	Ask what breaks if the glue and the scissors are swapped.
Prepared text:	Passage 12

Teacher guidance

Expected answer:
