TIME

30 minutes

OBJECTIVE

Work out what the big brother's questions actually mean, and whether his sister answers them.

STUDENT PRODUCT

Rows for each question the brother asks, with a box for what it means and a box for her answer

FOCUS

Questions asked in sayings, and answered without being understood

Essential question

Does she ever answer what her brother is really asking?

Text to mark before teaching

Passage 3 — the girl in her hat in a car, her brother beside her Passage 4 — the same car, the brother with his eyes shut Passage 5 — the same car again, the girl looking straight ahead Passage 7 — the same row of children, one biting her lip Passage 8 — the girl at a grand piano, an audience behind her Passage 10 — the family crowding round the girl, who holds roses

Lesson sequence

1	The first question · 6 min
Focus:	A question in a saying
Teacher model:	Read this page and ask what the brother means, then read her answer on the next page.
Prepared text:	Passage 3, Passage 4
2	Fill the rows · 11 min
Teacher direction:	For each question and answer, write what the saying means and how much of it she answers.
Expected answer:	She says of course she is - and later says she is not nervous at all because she is cool as a cucumber, which is the brother's own phrase. She has borrowed his words rather than answered him.
Prepared text:	Passage 5, Passage 7

Teacher direction:	Read what happens at the recital and say whose view the book backs.
Expected answer:	Her fingers stop and she cannot remember how the piece starts. The brother's doubt was justified, even though he was being annoying about it.

Prepared text:	Passage 8
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4 Afterwards · 5 min	
Focus:	A brother who turns out to have been right
Teacher direction:	Read what the brother whispers at the end and ask whether he is being unkind.
Prepared text:	Passage 10

Teacher guidance

Why this text works: Each question is printed as a saying and each reply is printed on its own page as two or three words, so the class can see exactly how much of the question the reply engages with.

Expected answer:	He asks whether she can take the heat, which means whether she can cope when it gets hard. Her whole answer is of course she can. He asks whether she is cool as a cucumber, which means calm, and her whole answer is of course she is. She never says how she knows, and at the recital she forgets her piece, so the brother's question was the right one.
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Model: Can you take the heat. That is not about being hot - it is about whether she will cope. And her answer is three words long, so she has not really answered it.

Teacher direction:	Write what each saying means and how much of it she answers.

Expected answer:	Of course she is - and she later repeats his own phrase about being cool as a cucumber.
Prepared text:	Passage 5, Passage 7

Teacher guidance
