Monologue in Context

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20 minutes

OBJECTIVE

Determine the meaning of monologue from a direct contextual definition and test it against a character's behavior.

STUDENT PRODUCT

A student-friendly definition plus one evidence sentence showing why the scene fits.

ESSENTIAL QUESTION

What does monologue mean, and what in Bradley's behavior matches that meaning?

TEXT FOCUS

The churchyard scene in which context directly explains the word.

LESSON SEQUENCE

1. Find the definition clue | 3 min Locate the words that explain monologue.
2. Restate | 4 min Write the meaning in your own words.
3. Test against behavior | 5 min Identify what Bradley does that fits the definition.
4. Apply | 6 min Create a short example and non-example of a monologue.
5. Check | 2 min A monologue is not simply any conversation.

TEACHER KEY / EXPECTED THINKING

A monologue is a long speech by one person; Bradley's extended one-person talking in the scene fits the direct contextual definition.

LOOK FOR

- Uses the direct definition clue.
- Restates the meaning accurately.
- Distinguishes a monologue from a back-and-forth conversation.
