# Comparing the Two Bedrooms

## OBJECTIVE

Compare two settings and explain how the contrast changes a character's response.

## STUDENT PRODUCT

A setting comparison plus one cause-and-response explanation.

## ESSENTIAL QUESTION

How does the contrast between the bedrooms affect Oliver's understanding of Diggory?

## TEXT FOCUS

Material details in Oliver's and Diggory's bedrooms.

## LESSON SEQUENCE

1. Room one | 3 min List two relevant details from Oliver's room.

2. Room two | 3 min List two contrasting details from Diggory's room.
3. Compare | 5 min State the most important contrast.
4. Connect to character | 7 min Explain how noticing the contrast changes Oliver's response or judgment.
5. Check | 2 min Use setting details as evidence, not decoration.

## TEACHER KEY / EXPECTED THINKING

The contrast between comfort and scarcity makes Diggory's situation concrete and changes Oliver's understanding from curiosity about objects toward concern for a person.

### LOOK FOR

- Uses details from both settings.
- States a clear contrast.
- Explains how setting affects character response.
