PASSAGE

30 minutes	A light begins to dawn

THE MOVE

Read contradiction as the beginning of self-recognition

WHY THIS PASSAGE

Edna’s awakening is described as illumination, yet the same new awareness reveals limits around her. Understanding gives direction and restriction at once, so self-recognition begins as both possibility and pain.

MARK

Circle the language of light, seeing, or awakening. Underline the words that describe barriers, prohibitions, or limits. Connect one image of discovery to one image of restriction.

NOTICE

- What new possibility does the 'light' make visible to Edna?

- What does she understand at the same time about the world she lives in?
- Why would greater self-knowledge make freedom feel both closer and more difficult?

THINK

Answer provisionally: Why does Chopin describe new understanding as something that both shows the way and forbids it? Choose the strongest interpretation you can defend from this passage alone.

WRITE

Write a short evidence-based response to: Why does Chopin describe new understanding as something that both shows the way and forbids it? Use at least two details from the assigned passage and explain how they support your interpretation.

CLOSE

Name the single detail that most changed or sharpened your interpretation, and explain why.

STRONG ANSWER	New understanding gives Edna direction because she begins to see herself more clearly, but it also reveals the social limits surrounding that self. Awareness opens possibility and pain at the same time.
EVIDENCE	Use the light/awakening imagery together with language of boundaries, prohibitions, or inaccessible freedom.
WATCH FOR	Do not resolve the contradiction by choosing either liberation or restriction. The passage makes self-recognition powerful because both arrive together.
SOLO	Read the exact passage independently.
SUPPORTED	Use narration and sentence highlighting while reading the same passage.
LISTENING	Listen to the exact passage; visual following is optional. Same question and evidence demand.

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OPEN THE MARKED PASSAGE IN TUMBLELIT

SOLO: read independently. SUPPORTED: use narration + highlighting. LISTENING: listen to the exact passage. The question and evidence task stay the same.
