THE MOVE

Track how scale changes a narrator's judgment of himself and others

WHY THIS PASSAGE

After living among giants, Gulliver's own species looks physically strange to him. Scale has reset his visual expectations, so ordinary human bodies now seem miniature and distorted. The passage shows that 'normal' is partly a judgment built from comparison.

MARK

Underline Gulliver's descriptions of ordinary-sized people after his return. Circle the words that make them seem unusually small or strange. Star the line where he recognizes that his perception, not their bodies, has changed.

NOTICE

- What physical facts about the people around Gulliver have actually changed?
- What has changed in Gulliver’s standard of comparison?
- How does the passage challenge the idea that size can be judged without a reference point?

THINK

Answer provisionally: How has living among giants changed Gulliver's sense of what counts as normal? Choose the strongest interpretation you can defend from this passage alone.

WRITE

Write a short evidence-based response to: How has living among giants changed Gulliver's sense of what counts as normal? Use at least two details from the assigned passage and explain how they support your interpretation.

CLOSE

Name the single detail that most changed or sharpened your interpretation, and explain why.

STRONG ANSWER	Living among giants resets Gulliver's scale of comparison. Ordinary humans have not changed, but they now look tiny, coarse, or strange because his standard of normal size has shifted.
EVIDENCE	Use Gulliver's descriptions of ordinary people after Brobdingnag and any moment where he recognizes the distortion lies in his perception.
WATCH FOR	Do not say the people actually become smaller. The lesson is about a changed comparative standard.
SOLO	Read the exact passage independently.
SUPPORTED	Use narration and sentence highlighting while reading the same passage.
LISTENING	Listen to the exact passage; visual following is optional. Same question and evidence demand.

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START ANCHOR	He said he wondered at one thing very much, which was, to hear me speak so loud
END ANCHOR	and I winked at my own littleness, as people do at their own faults.

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OPEN THE MARKED PASSAGE IN TUMBLELIT

SOLO: read independently. SUPPORTED: use narration + highlighting. LISTENING: listen to the exact passage. The question and evidence task stay the same.
