THE MOVE

Read a moral decision against the moral system that produced it

WHY THIS PASSAGE

Huck believes helping Jim is morally wrong because the society that formed his conscience tells him so. When he tears up the letter and accepts damnation, the reader sees a moral victory expressed through the language of moral failure.

MARK

Underline the reasons Huck gives for believing he should turn Jim in. Circle the memories of Jim that interrupt that reasoning. Star the sentence in which Huck chooses what he thinks is sin.

NOTICE

- What moral system is Huck using when he calls helping Jim wrong?
- Which lived experiences challenge that system?
- Why does the reader judge the decision differently from Huck?

THINK

Answer provisionally: Why does Huck describe helping Jim as damnation at the moment the reader sees it as his strongest moral choice? Choose the strongest interpretation you can defend from this passage alone.

WRITE

Write a short evidence-based response to: Why does Huck describe helping Jim as damnation at the moment the reader sees it as his strongest moral choice? Use at least two details from the assigned passage and explain how they support your interpretation.

CLOSE

Name the single detail that most changed or sharpened your interpretation, and explain why.

STRONG ANSWER	Huck calls the choice damnation because his inherited conscience labels helping Jim sinful, while the reader sees loyalty and humanity. The scene exposes a moral system capable of making the right action feel wrong.
EVIDENCE	Use Huck's reasons for turning Jim in, memories of Jim, the letter, and the 'go to hell' decision.
WATCH FOR	Do not say Huck knowingly chooses good over evil. He believes he is choosing evil; that is the point of the moral irony.
SOLO	Read the exact passage independently.
SUPPORTED	Use narration and sentence highlighting while reading the same passage.
LISTENING	Listen to the exact passage; visual following is optional. Same question and evidence demand.
