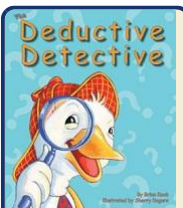

Teaching this set

A clue is not yet a conclusion.

Set up an evidence board with observation, possible meaning, competing explanation, and conclusion. Remind students that a guess becomes an inference only when evidence connects it to the problem. Read the six in order: Start here. Now build the idea. Now make it harder. Now test the idea. Now revise

the first theory. End by putting it together. Build the strongest explanation for one mystery, then use two other books to justify the evidence rules your explanation follows.

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
